The agenda was full with guest speakers from F&W Forestry Services, Diverse Power, Troup County 4H Extension Office, as well as, college representatives from West Georgia Technical College, Auburn University, ABAC, University of Georgia, and the University of West Georgia.

During their morning break, students could visit with college representatives to receive information about enrollment opportunities. They also had a chance to test their "corn-hole skills" as well as participate in a Scavenger Hunt.

Gabi Martinez of LaGrange High shared, "It's was a really good opportunity to meet other students and talk with them about what they're doing in FFA in their schools." Jacob Bearden of Troup High said, "FFA means more than just farms and agriculture, it's an outlet for students and it provides leadership in the community.' Callaway High student, Cameron Gravitt said; "It's been an amazing opportunity to meet everyone. It's like being a community and family."

Secondary Education Director Jonathan Laney shared; "I appreciate the initiative and hard work of all our Ag Teachers in TCSS.
